

## Campus Climate Survey for UCSD - Findings Related to Graduate Students<sup>1</sup>

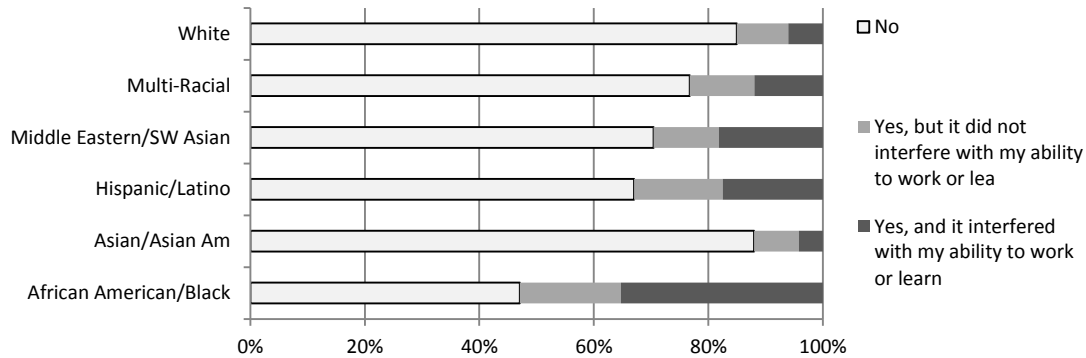
Graduate/Professional Students Overall Response Rate: 24% ( $n = 1,351$ ). Response rates to important questions were often lower.

Graduate students reported roughly equal comfort levels with the overall campus and classroom environment.

African American/Black, Latino, and multi-racial, as well as gender queer, respondents reported the lowest comfort levels among graduate students.

African American graduate students also had the highest reported rate of negative experiences.

**Within the past year, have you personally experienced any exclusionary (e.g., shunned, ignored), intimidating, offensive and/or hostile (bullied, harassing) behavior at UCSD?**



20% of Graduate/Professional Students had seriously considered leaving UC San Diego.

- 23% of White respondents and 30% of Underrepresented Minority student respondents
- 20% of heterosexual respondents and 31% of LGBQ respondents
- 15% of respondents that were not Low Income students and 23% of Low Income respondents
- 18% of respondents without disabilities and 29% with disabilities

Incorporating diversity/cross-cultural competency more effectively into curriculum	78.20%
Providing diversity training for staff	75.70%
Providing diversity training for faculty	75.60%
Providing diversity training for students	71.40%

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<sup>1</sup> Results presented in tables and charts refer to graduate students only and were calculated by VC-EDI. All findings presented represent all surveys that were at least 50% completed by respondents. The number of total respondents (*n*'s) varied by survey question and, at times, by section within one question. Response rates for lesbian, queer, and Middle Eastern were very low and these results should be interpreted with caution. Too few Native American respondents completed the survey to produce results for this group.
